

Welcome to ALL

The Academy for Lifelong Learning (ALL) is an organization open to anyone age 50 or over that offers its members the opportunity to pursue educational interests and to expand social relationships. Volunteerism is critical to ALL's ongoing success. Members are encouraged to become class coordinators (teachers), participate on committees, work on administrative activities, or just participate in any of ALL's activities and functions. The opportunity for social interaction is an important aspect of ALL. In addition to classes, the Academy offers social activities and special events such as lectures, occasional trips, theater productions and museum visits.

ALL standing committees are responsible for the day-to-day operations, both social and educational. Most of the real work ensuring the smooth running of ALL takes place through the activities of these volunteer committees. Please consider volunteering for one of these committees:

Curriculum: Recruits coordinators, develops class schedules, and publishes the catalog.

Nominating: Identifies and solicits candidates for the board of directors. **Long Range Planning:** Addresses the future needs of the Academy.

Special Events: Plans and organizes lectures and outside events throughout the year.

Policies and Procedures: Maintains policies and procedures in accordance with ALL bylaws.

Hospitality: Plans and organizes social events for the membership.

Finance: Oversees the financial aspects of ALL, working with the treasurer.

Communications: Informs ALL members about events and programs via ALL's newsletter and website.

Registration: Processes applications, collects membership fees and confirms class enrollment.

The Registration Process

Covid Policy

ALL will follow the Covid protocols required by Cape Cod Community College for any ALL members attending in-person classes. At the time of printing, the college requires proof of vaccination (two Pfizer, two Moderna or one Johnson and Johnson). Please include a copy of your proof of vaccination when you mail your registration form and check or email a photograph of your proof to allvaccinations@gmail.com. Your registration for in-person classes cannot be processed if proof of vaccination has not been received. We will keep our membership informed of any changes to Covid protocol via email and our website capecodall.org.

Course Selection

For your planning purposes, a consolidated list of courses, arranged by day and time, appears after the course descriptions in this catalog. This list will also be posted on our website www.capecodall.org. Please complete the course selection area of the registration form using each course number, name, day, time and location. Courses listed with a room number (Grossman C-106 or C-115) are taught in person. Courses listed with Zoom are taught remotely. Each semester, a member can select up to four 6-week classes, two 12- week classes, or one 12-week and two 6-week classes. Class sizes may vary, so it is important to list alternatives in case your first-choice classes are filled. If no alternatives are listed and your first-choice classes are full, it will be assumed that none are desired, and your payment will be refunded after all registrations are processed.

Note: The views and opinions expressed in classes are those of our coordinators and their guest speakers and may, on occasion, be controversial.

Registration

Registration processing begins Monday, August 22, and all members will have an equal chance of getting their course choices if their completed registration forms with a signed check (and proof of vaccination for those requesting in-person classes) are received by Friday, August 19. Registrations received after that date will be processed daily but not until the original group has been processed. Be sure to include a check for the membership fee, currently \$105.00, made out to ALL. Unfortunately, we cannot accept credit cards and debit cards. If possible, please complete your form using your computer BEFORE printing. Please also make a copy of your completed registration form for your records. To ensure a fair assignment of classes, ALL uses a random selection process. No preference will be given to early postmarks. Incomplete information or documentation may delay the processing of your registration. Please prioritize your course selections on the registration form and include alternate choices in the event that your selections are full.

We will attempt to contact you by email or telephone if none of your selected courses or alternate courses is available or if your check is missing or unsigned, so complete and accurate contact information is important if questions come up about your registration form. It is very important that ALL has your correct email address, since that is how you will receive class enrollment confirmations and that is how the coordinator will contact you with class information. Email your questions regarding the registration process to lifelonglearning@capecod.edu. We will attempt to answer your questions promptly. Throughout the registration process and the semester, a list of courses with space available will be posted on the ALL website www.capecodall.org. After the first week of each semester, members may seek enrollment in any of those open courses by contacting lifelonglearning@capecod.edu.

Membership Fees

The membership fee, currently \$105 per person, is paid for each semester in which a member chooses to take courses. The fee covers membership in ALL including any combination of courses as described above plus other educational and social activities (though some events may involve an additional charge). Having been enrolled once, and even if no further fees are paid, members remain on our records for another year and will continue to receive communications. Course coordinators are not paid and are not subject to the membership fee. In keeping with the purpose of ALL, there may be circumstances where ALL grants free membership to applicants in financial need. Application for this assistance is made via a letter to the president of ALL, and all such information is kept strictly confidential. Classes with low enrollments may be canceled outright, in which case registered attendees will be notified. Those who registered for these courses may enroll in other courses, based on space available, or receive a refund. Refunds of membership fees are available only through the first week of class except in special circumstances and will be issued after the class registration process is completed.

Withdrawals

If you find you are unable to attend a course after receiving your course confirmation, please leave a message or email so we may add the seat back into our inventory. If you begin a course and find that you will not continue to attend, please notify the ALL office as well as the coordinator. There may be circumstances where one or more coordinators need to temporarily cancel a class session, in which case they will make reasonable efforts to reschedule that class.

FYI

The ALL office will be closed until September, and we are working remotely during the summer. The office administrator is on duty from 9:00 am to 3:00 pm most weekdays, and the telephone number to reach us is 774-330-4400. We suggest that you send us comments and questions by email to lifelonglearning@capecod.edu.

Class Locations

In-person classes will be offered on the Cape Cod Community College (CCCC) main campus at 2240 lyannough Rd. (Route 132) in West Barnstable. Courses will be held in rooms **C-106** and **C-115**. Both rooms are on the mezzanine level of the **Grossman Commons building**.

Use of Zoom

Fall semester 2022 courses beginning in September 2022 will be taught either in-person or on Zoom. If you have selected Zoom classes and are unfamiliar with using it, we recommend viewing a video entitled "Joining a Zoom Call for the First Time; Fun and Easy Online Connection," which is viewable at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=9isp3qPeQ0E.

Helpful Hints in Zoom Classes

Conduct yourselves as you would if you were all in the same room. These tips below help ensure the class goes smoothly for all involved:

- Join early up to 5 minutes before the class start time.
- Have your video on unless you are experiencing connection issues.
- Find a guiet space without interruptions or background noise.
- If possible, have a plain background and avoid backlight from bright windows.
- Have good lighting on your face so you can be seen clearly.
- Adjust your camera to be at around eye level if possible especially take note of the angle of your laptop screen if using the built-in camera.
- Try to avoid talking over / at the same time as other participants.
- Be aware you are on camera and visible to your classmates, so try to avoid doing other tasks (eating, checking your phone, etc.)
- Use both the "mute" icon and the "leave video" icon (next to the "mute" icon) when eating or snacking, walking around, answering the phone, or leaving the room.
- If you wish to ask a question or offer a comment, please raise your hand so that the coordinator can see it on-screen.

General Regulations


- •The campus speed limit is 20 miles per hour.
- •Crosswalks are clearly marked. Cars must stop and wait until pedestrians have crossed the street safely.
- Park in public lots, being especially careful to park within the white lines (front, back, and sides).
- •Be sure that your driver's license and registration are valid, and that you have a current inspection sticker and insurance.

Disabled Parking

- •Disabled parking is ONLY for those who display a Disabled plate/placard from the RMV.
- Park carefully within the designated white lines (front, back, and sides).
- Pick-up and drop-off areas are outside the Grossman Commons entrance near the elevator opposite the radio station.

The direct phone number to College Police is 774-330-4349. Please add this telephone number to your contact list. The College Police and Public Safety Office is located opposite the cafeteria on the first floor of Grossman.

Should you find that the Disabled Parking spots near Grossman Commons are not available and you have a valid RMV Disabled plate/placard, the following alternatives are suggested by College Police: Additional Disabled Parking is located on the drive leading to the Science Building. Another alternative is to call College Police (774-330-4949) to request to be taken to and from Grossman Commons before and after your class.

Introduction to Origami Monday 9:00AM - 10:20AM First 6 Weeks 12-Sep

ALL1105 Zoom Limit: 25

This course is for those who have no experience folding but are intrigued by origami. With the coordinator teaching models step by step you will turn a simple piece of paper into a box, a bowl, a bird, or a flower. You will be asked to bring newly-folded models for 'show and tell'. Benefits of origami include increased concentration and focus and improved fine motor skills and the ability to think in 3-dimensions. Please purchase one package (about 100 sheets) of six-inch (15 cm) origami paper called kami, color on one side and white on the other side. Additional supplies will be discussed at the first meeting.

Coordinator: Andrea Plate. Andrea has practiced origami for over 13 years and displays her work in local art shows. She has participated in online workshops, attended origami conventions, and recently taken private tutorials with world-renowned origamists. Her passion is sharing the value, benefits, and joy of folding.

Three Comic Gems by Rossini

Grossman 106 Limit: 18

Rossini's comedies are treasures of the operatic world. This course will showcase three of his greatest--The Barber of Seville, L'Italiana in Algeri, and Le Comte Ory. Great singers in performances from opera houses around the world will be featured.

Coordinator: Steve Piontek. Steve has taught a variety of courses at ALL including courses on the operas of Verdi, Mozart, Wagner, and Rossini, among others. He most recently taught a course called The Great Yeats.

Origami Containers

Monday 9:00AM - 10:20AM Second 6 Weeks 31-Oct

Zoom Limit: 25

This will be the seventh origami class at ALL, and it is assumed that you have previous experience. The focus this semester will be on folding models that hold things: boxes, dishes, envelopes, vases and more. The coordinator will teach the model step by step, answering questions along the way. In order to strengthen your

learning you will be asked to fold the model again as homework and then bring your work to the next class for 'show and tell'. You will need larger squares of origami paper (9 to 12 inches is good). An email will be sent to you with more detail about two weeks before class starts. Coordinator: Andrea Plate. Andrea has practiced origami for over 13 years and displays her work in local art shows. She has participated in online workshops, attended origami conventions, and recently taken private tutorials with world renowned origamists. Her passion is sharing the value, benefits, and joy of folding.

The Third Reich

Monday 10:30AM - 11:50AM First 6 Weeks 12-Sep

Grossman 106 Limit: 18

This course will study the Third Reich through discussion and the appearance of various characters of the Nazi era as the coordinator dons the clothing and persona of the various participants to answer questions from the class as if that person were actually present.

Coordinator: Stephen R. Pastore. Stephen has taught many courses at ALL including courses on the Third Reich and the Holocaust.

Memoirs - Lest We Forget

Monday 10:30AM - 11:50AM 12 Weeks 12-Sep

Zoom Limit: 18

We have all had time to reflect on our life experiences. Some of us have begun writing memoirs to share family history, events, travels, and life experiences. Others want to begin this journey into their memory bank. In this class participants are asked to bring and share some of their writings. Other will get ideas from class discussion and listening to others. During the first class, members will get to know each other, brainstorm some writing topics, and try a free writing technique. The class is interactive.

Coordinator: Dianne Tattersall. Dianne is a retired secondary English teacher and department chair who has taught a variety of writing classes and workshops. She has published articles on writing and student leadership.

Genetic Genealogy: DNA Testing for Growing Your Family Tree

Monday 10:30AM - 11:50AM Second 6 Weeks 31-Oct Zoom Limit: 25

This class will cover how to use DNA testing to enrich your genealogy hobby and focus on the practical utility of DNA testing rather than the science of DNA. We will cover such topics as privacy, being prepared for unexpected results, how to interpret ethnicity results, and best practices for identifying and contacting newly discovered relatives. We will review the most popular DNA testing platforms. Participants should have some experience and understanding of traditional genealogy research. Class text is *The Family Tree Guide to DNA Testing and Genetic Genealogy*, 2nd Edition by Blaine T. Bettinger. Additional articles of interest will be distributed. A short questionnaire will be emailed before the first class.

Coordinator: Susan Feinberg. Susan is an enthusiastic amateur genealogist who retired from a career in banking technology. She has used DNA to find scores of 'new' cousins and frequently volunteers to help others use their DNA results to add members to their family trees.

Being Mortal

ALL867

Monday 10:30AM - 11:50AM Second 6 Weeks 31-Oct Grossman 106 Limit: 18

This class starts with and expands on *Being Mortal*, a best seller from 2014. In this discussion-based offering, we will explore topics related to the last stage of life and how we might prepare. Included are such subjects as housing alternatives, talking with your children, examining chronic and acute illnesses, the likelihood of which increase with age, planning your own funeral, and assisted suicide. The text is *Being Mortal* by Atul Gawande. Used copies are available on Amazon. For the first class please read the Introduction and Independent Self.

Coordinator: Marilyn Nouri. Marilyn, a retired professor of sociology at SUNY Oneonta, has coordinated many classes for ALL. She is presenting Being Mortal for the sixth time, now offering it from a life course perspective as growing old is a lifelong process.

A Survey of Art Herstory: Did Michelangelo Have a Sister?

Second 6 Weeks 31-Oct

Limit: 15

This introductory course on the achievements of women artists (focusing on Western Art) from the ancient world to the present will use brief videos and slides. What social, economic, religious, and political factors have helped marginalize women's participation in art. How does women's art differ from the 'male gaze'? We will focus on the post WWII era when women artists have emerged as a dynamic force in contemporary art, consider inequity in the art world, and ask whether feminist artists including the Gorilla Girls and Judy Chicago's The Dinner Party have begun a shift in perspective on the role of women in the art world. Coordinator: Lois Karfunkel. Lois, a retired attorney, has had a long-standing interest in art. She helped teach a Great Courses class on American art and is looking forward to exploring with fellow participants this previously hidden -- to her -- world of amazing women artists.

12 Directors/12 Masterpieces - New Edition ALL1173Monday 12:00PM - 1:20PM Zoom

12 Weeks 12-Sep Limit: 30

This course will discuss and analyze 12 films from world-renowned directors past and present. The discussion will center on the story construction, the film's visual elements, the particular filmic style of the director, and why it is considered a masterpiece. Note that this is a new edition of the course, with new films. For the first class please watch *The Sweet Hereafter* (1997) directed by Atom Egoyan. A full list of 12 films will be provided on the first class.

Coordinator: Joseph Gonzalez. Joe worked as a bilingual script supervisor in movies, commercials, music videos, and television as well as a screenwriter of short and feature films for 36 years. He studied film at the New School for Social Research in New York City and has taught several cinema courses at ALL.

Introducing Mr. Sherlock Holmes

Monday 12:00PM - 1:20PM First 6 Weeks 12-Sep Grossman 106 Limit: 18

This course will examine the life and cases of the world's first (and greatest) consulting detective, his biographer, Dr. John H. Watson, and Watson's literary agent, Sir Arthur Conan Doyle. The only pre-requisite for this course is a willing suspension of disbelief.

Coordinator: John Kennedy. John has coordinated numerous courses in history and literature at ALL, including this one back in 2009.

The 'Offspring' of Sherlock Holmes

Monday 12:00PM - 1:20PM Second 6 Weeks 31-Oct Grossman 106 Limit: 18

This course will explore the adventures of American private detectives, especially those of the 'hard-boiled' variety. Special attention will be paid to Philip Marlowe, Sam Spade, Nero Wolfe, and Travis McGee. The lives of their creators will also be discussed.

Coordinator: John Kennedy. John has coordinated numerous courses in history and literature at ALL, including this one back in 2009.

Beadweaving: Beginner and Intermediate - Section A

Monday 1:30PM - 2:50PM First 6 Weeks 12-Sep Grossman 115 Limit: 10

Learn fundamental beading techniques to create your own style. Course is open to either beginners or those desiring a review. It will include basic peyote and herringbone stitches in a hands-on workshop presentation. A supply list and/or a beginner kit will be available.

Coordinator: Kathleen Taylor. Kathy is a lifelong artisan with degrees in art and education and currently runs a bead shop, Not Just Beads, in West Dennis. She is a member of the Cape Cod Bead Society.

Discussing the Essay

Monday 1:30PM - 2:50PM Second 6 Weeks 31-Oct Zoom Limit: 25

Using the book, *The Best American Essays, 2021*, the class members will discuss two essays each session by sharing ideas and thoughts, while using a dose of skepticism,

about the issues raised in each of the essays. The editor of the book writes that the essays selected do the best job of showing literary achievement, awareness of craft, and force of thought. The text is available in paperback on Amazon or on Kindle.

Coordinator: Marilyn Nouri. Marilyn, a retired college professor of sociology, enjoys the opportunity to teach by coordinating classes for ALL. There are no papers to grade and members, who are there because they choose to be, come well informed with life experience for discussions.

Native American Chronicle

Monday 1:30PM - 2:50PM Second 6 Weeks 31-Oct Grossman 106 Limit: 18

Explore with us Native American history and experience. We will start with theories of the origin/arrival of first Americans... or were these people here from the start? Then we will have an overview of cultural areas, namely Eastern Woodland, Plains, Southwest, and Northwest Coast. Next we will discuss contacts and conflicts, East and West; treaties; reservations; and boarding schools; and lastly, current affairs including casinos, health issues, language revival, and environmental/spiritual concerns. Coordinator(s): Frank Cuphone, John Kennedy. Frank is a lifelong student of Native America and has taught NA studies from pre-school to university level.

John has taught history and literature courses at the

university level and for many years at ALL.


