Welcome to ALL

Course Selection

For your planning purposes, a consolidated list of courses arranged by day and time appears after the course descriptions in this catalog, which will also be posted on our website **www.capecodall.org**. Please complete the course selection area of the registration form using each course number, name, day, and time. If possible, please complete your form using your computer, tablet, or phone BEFORE printing. A member can select up to four 6-week classes per semester, two 12-week classes, or one 12-week and two 6-week classes.

Class sizes may vary, so it is important to list alternatives in case your first-choice classes are filled. If no alternatives are listed, and your first-choice classes are full, it will be assumed that none are desired and your payment will be refunded after all registrations are processed.

Registration

Registration processing begins Monday, January 11, and all members will have an equal chance of getting their course choices if their completed registration forms with a signed check are received in the mail by Friday, January 8. Registrations received after that date will be processed daily but not until the original group is processed. Be sure to include a check for the membership fee, currently \$105, made out to ALL. Unfortunately, we cannot accept credit cards and debit cards.

If possible, please complete your form using your computer, tablet, or phone BEFORE printing. Please also make a copy of your completed registration form for your records.

To ensure a fair assignment of classes, ALL uses a random selection process. No preference will be given to early postmarks. Any incomplete section may delay the processing of your registration form and missing or unsigned checks will cause your place in the queue to be lost. Please prioritize your course selections on the numbered registration form and include alternate choices in the event that your selections are full. We will attempt to contact you by e-mail or telephone if none of your selected courses or alternate courses is available or if your check is missing or unsigned, so complete and accurate contact information is important if questions come up about your registration form.

It is very important that ALL has your correct e-mail address, since that is how you will receive class enrollment confirmations and that is how the coordinator will contact you about Zoom access to the class.

The ALL office and desk at Cape Cod Community College will still not be staffed for a while. Messages left at 774-330-4400 will be checked remotely on a regular basis but it will be more effective to email your questions regarding the registration process to lifelonglearning@capecod.edu. Include a phone number if you would like someone to call you back. We will attempt to answer your questions promptly.

During the first week of classes, a list of courses with space available will be posted on the ALL website **www.capecodall.org**. After the first week of each semester, members may enroll in any of those courses if they have the approval of the coordinator.

Membership Fees

The membership fee, currently \$105 per person, is paid for each semester in which a member chooses to take courses. The fee covers membership in ALL including any combination of courses as described above plus other educational and social activities (though some events may involve an additional charge). Having been enrolled once, and even if no further fees are paid, members remain on our records for another year and will continue to receive communications. Course coordinators are not subject to the membership fee.

In keeping with the purpose of ALL, there may be circumstances where ALL grants free membership to applicants in need. Application for this assistance is made via a letter to the president of ALL, and all such information is kept strictly confidential. Classes with low enrollments may be canceled outright, in which case registered attendees will be notified. Those who registered for these courses may enroll in other courses, based on space available, or receive a refund. Refunds of membership fees are available only through the first week of class except in special circumstances and will be issued after the class registration process is completed.

Withdrawals

If you find you are unable to attend a course after receiving your course confirmation, please leave a message or email so we may add the seat back into our inventory. If you begin a course and find that you will not be attending, please notify the ALL office as well as the coordinator.

With an on-line learning structure, there may be circumstances where one or more coordinators need to temporarily cancel a class session, in which case they will make reasonable efforts to reschedule that class.

The ALL office is closed, and we are working remotely. The office administrator is on duty from 9:00 am to 3:00 pm most weekdays, and the telephone number to reach us is 774-330-4400. You can also send us comments and questions by e-mail to lifelonglearning@capecod.edu or acadlll@capecod.edu.

Use of Zoom

Spring semester 2021 courses beginning in February 2021 will continue to be taught on Zoom. If you are new to Zoom or not yet comfortable using Zoom, we recommend viewing a video entitled "Joining a Zoom Call for the First Time; Fun and Easy Online Connection," which is viewable at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=9isp3qPeQ0E.

Helpful Hints

Conduct yourselves as you would if you were all in the same room. These tips below help ensure the class goes smoothly for all involved:

- If you haven't used Zoom before, go to Zoom.us prior to the day of the meeting and familiarize yourself with any features you may need to use on the day mute/unmute microphone, stop/start video, screenshare etc.
- Join early up to 5 minutes before the meeting start time.
- Have your video on unless you are experiencing connection issues.
- Find a quiet space without interruptions or background noise.
- If possible, have a plain background and avoid backlight from bright windows.
- Have good lighting on your face so you can be seen clearly.
- Adjust your camera to be at around eye level if possible especially take note of the angle of your laptop screen if using the built-in camera.
- Mute your microphone when not talking.
- Try to avoid talking over / at the same time as other participants.
- Be aware you are on camera, so try to avoid doing other tasks (checking emails, looking at your phone, etc.)
- If you wish to ask a question or offer a comment, please raise your hand so that the coordinator can see it on-screen.

MONDAY

Immigration in America: Policy and Practice	ALL1108
Monday 9:00AM - 10:20AM	ZOOM
First 6 Weeks 1-Feb	Limit: 25

We will examine various aspects of immigration policy and types of immigration, including family reunification, refugees, asylum, employment, DACA, and the undocumented. Emphasis will be on the implementation of immigration policy, so we will also review the role of bureaucracies, public and private, in the immigration process. Short on-line reading assignments will be posted. Powerpoint presentations will be available and included with the discussions. The format of the course will be oriented toward discussion. For the first class, please review your family history of immigration. Who came? When did they come? Where did they come from? Why did they come? Be prepared to discuss these in class. Coordinator: Richard Vengroff. Richard is a political scientist specializing in comparative politics (North America and Africa) and immigration policy and practice. In recent years he has worked as a counselor on immigration issues for refugees, asylees and other immigrants with non profits in Cambridge, Lowell and on Cape Cod (currently with CACCI).

"Oh, the THINKS They Can Think!"ALL1172(Parenting and Grand-Parenting Gifted Children)Monday 9:00AM - 10:20AMFirst 6 Weeks 1-FebLimit: 25

In this course we will explore some of the complexities related to understanding the psychology and education of gifted children: from the implications of personality and behavioral characteristics, to formal and informal means of identification, to parenting, to how this special needs population needs to learn. Most educators receive little or no training in educating gifted children and, next to those who raise them, educators are the most significant developmental shapers in their lives. Coordinator: Nina Greenwald. Nina, an educational psychologist with specialization in gifted education, has taught gifted students of all ages. She has published in the field and is co-founder of MAGE (The Massachusetts Association for Gifted Education) which advances understanding of gifted children and their special needs and encourages the exchange of information among educators, parents, policy-makers, and students on the national, state, and local level.

Friederich Froebel, the German kindergarten founder, made Origami, or paperfolding, a key component of children's play. We will learn to fold at least 20 different origami quilt squares from beginner to intermediate levels of difficulty. Once you understand the techniques and the squares, you will design an origami quilt worthy of framing. Please purchase a package of 15 cm or 6 inch origami paper, also called kami. It must have color on one side and white on the other side. RECOMMENDATION: Taro's Origami Studio or Toyo paper, both available from Amazon. CAUTION: Do not buy the large packages of "for schools or groups" paper. They are not always square, making folding difficult.

Coordinator: Andrea Plate. Andrea has practiced origami for over 10 years and displays her work in local art shows. She has studied independently, by participating in online workshops and by attending origami conventions. Her passion is sharing the value, benefits, and joy of folding with others. She has been successfully teaching origami through zoom for both ALL and other organizations.

Come join this course to explore various movie genres from thought-provoking to comedic, including both recent and earlier classic films. Questions will be distributed in advance to facilitate class discussion. Movies are accessible free of charge via local libraries or the Boston Public Library's free streaming service. Movies include *Hidden Figures, A Beautiful Mind* and others TBA. **Coordinator: Nancy Tucker.** Nancy's career has included sales training and volunteer instructor. Her personal interests are hiking, (former AMC leader), movies, social event planning, nature, and whatever promises fun.

12 Weeks 1-Feb	Limit: 25

This course will analyze and discuss films from worldrenowned directors past and present. The discussions will center on the elements of the film that are germane to the style of the director, each film's critical reception, and why each is considered a masterpiece of film making. Before the first class a list of the films and their viewing availability will be provided. For the first class please watch *A Touch of Evil*, Orson Welles, director. (1958)1hr/35mins., available on line.

Coordinator: Joseph Gonzalez. Joe worked as a bilingual script supervisor in movies, commercials, music videos, and television as well as a screenwriter of short and feature films for 36 years. He studied film at the New School for Social Research in New York City. He has previously taught other courses on movies for ALL.

Food for Thought: Plato at the Table	ALL1051
Monday 12:00PM - 1:20PM	ZOOM
First 6 Weeks 1-Feb	Limit: 15

This course will give an historical review of the cuisine of ancient Greece and Rome with philosophical commentary sprinkled in. It is based on *The Philosopher's Kitchen*, by Francine Segan, which is filled with what one celebrity chef called "delectable, timeless, and earthy recipes" adapted for the modern cook. Since the course is offered virtually, I will share recipes of some already prepared Mediterranean dishes. We will also discuss some timely topics related to knowledge, justice, love, politics, and healthcare. I will provide links to articles and videos we will discuss. Purchasing the text is not necessary, although used copies are available online.

Coordinator: Mare Ambrose. Mare is currently a part-time professor of English and philosophy at a local community college. This class combines her lifelong passions for philosophy and food.

History is what we choose to remember. This course will introduce some of the people who have woven Massachusetts' historic fabric. Topics will include the motivations behind Salem Witch trials and their victims and villains; legislation regulating enslavement by the Massachusetts Bay Colony; the role of power, prejudice, and fake news in the 1721 smallpox epidemic in Boston; the causes of the Boston Massacre and John Adams' defense of Captain Preston; the building, utility and cost of the Worcester Canal, the Hoosac Tunnel, and the Quabbin Reservoir. Please come with an open mind, a good sense of humor, and tolerance of a novice coordinator.

Coordinator: Stephen Anderson. Steve, a lifelong resident of Massachusetts, is a retired trial lawyer who traveled the state. His interest in local history was enhanced by plaques and memorials he read at courthouses while waiting for judges or juries, mostly judges. He has been a member of ALL for three years. So far so good!

First 6 Weeks 2-Feb	Limit: 25

We will use The Weather Book by Jack Williams and other sources to better understand the fundamentals of climate and weather and how the weather is modeled and forecast. The class will have a special focus on weather conditions predicted for Cape Cod in the seasons and years ahead. Attendees will leave the class with a better sense of what makes our weather change and what long-term conditions are expected for the Cape. Text: The Weather Book, Second Edition, by Jack Williams for USA Today. ISBN 0-679-77665-6, available new or used. Any required reading will be emailed before class starts. Coordinators: Paul Coteus, John Ward. John, a long time private pilot and amateur meteorologist, will focus on what drives the weather short term and how to better understand forecasts. Paul, a recently retired physicist and IBM Fellow, will focus on climate. He has been leading a small team of scientists, engineers, and concerned folks to study methods to remove excess carbon from the atmosphere (see globalcarboncatchers.com).

Climate Change and What You Can Do about It ALL1127

Second 6 Weeks 23-Mar	Limit: 25

We will briefly explain the science behind climate change, covering the carbon cycle, ocean currents, atmospheric wind patterns, and the greenhouse effect. We will then determine our individual carbon footprints and discuss the myriad ways in which they can be reduced. Finally, we will discuss the grief that people feel about climate change and their coping strategies for it. Coordinators will provide references for material covered in the class. **Coordinators: Paul Coteus, Cindi Bucken.** Paul, a recently retired elementary particle physicist and IBM Fellow, has led a small team of scientists, engineers, and other concerned citizens to study the best way to remove excess carbon from the atmosphere (see globalcarboncatchers.com). Cindi, a retired guidance counselor, supports local efforts related to climate justice, including climate change.

This course is not about religion. It is about reading your written work or storytelling on transcendent life experiences such as forgiveness, acceptance, and change, suffering and joy, journey and home, and success and failure. Sharing can replace confusion with clarity and bring more freedom. A paperback, *Falling Upward: A Spirituality for the Two Halves of Life* by Richard Rohr, is referenced (but not required). We welcome discussion on your favorite spiritual writings.

Coordinator: Frank Noonan. Frank is an emeritus professor at Worcester Polytechnic Institute. He is a certified spiritual director and a former university ombudsperson. Most important, he is a pilgrim, a seeker if you will, looking to grow through coordinating.

Travel Talk: The Future Look of Travel	ALL1159

First 6 Weeks 2-Feb	Limit: 25

The coronavirus has certainly impacted the life of travelers. Many cruises and trips had to be cancelled since March. During this course we will explore what the future of travel will look like. When will it be safe to travel again domestically and internationally? How will airports and car rentals change? What will river and ocean cruises do to lure travelers back? What changes are airlines making? How will package tours reflect the concerns of travelers? Will cancellation policies change? I welcome questions and comments from class members. You will need an email address and access to a computer during the class sessions.

Coordinator: Connie Champlin. Connie has traveled extensively for the past 40 years to practically every state in the U.S. and almost all continents. She has taught a travel class in Sandwich and this travel class many times at ALL.

This seminar has the potential of becoming the start of a series. What might be the six key turning-point moments in our ancient history? How did we become human? What does it mean to be a woman? What were the implications of the invention of economics and of the phonic alphabet? How did ancient science oppose religion? Why did the Western Empire fall? I will offer something for the first half-class and we will discuss things in the second.

Coordinator: Lawrence Brown. Lawrence has been a teacher at Cape Cod Academy for 34 years and a columnist for the *Cape Cod Times* for 34. He has published five books, including a text on geography, and has taught ancient history for 26 years.

This seminar has two objectives, to provide an understanding of the world's faiths and to help the participants see where their own personal beliefs fit in the overall spectrum. If you are in some kind of spiritual search, the sessions will be structured to help you clarify where the beliefs you already have fit in ... and where the opinions of others fit in, too.

Coordinator: Lawrence Brown. Lawrence has been a teacher at Cape Cod Academy for 34 years and a columnist for the *Cape Cod Times* for 34. He has published five books, including a text on Hindu theology, and lectured at two Parliaments of the World's Religions.

This course will continue the saga of New York City, our greatest metropolis, using the Ric Burns documentary as a guide through its most recent history. There will be time for viewing additional historical material including slides and for class discussion.

the Human Genome and the Science behind It

This course will cover the history, science and impact of the human genome project. The latter half of the course will focus on advances in medical science, ethical challenges, and other societal issues arising in this postgenomic era, including our understanding of human origins. Class discussion is encouraged and students with specific interests relevant to the course will be offered an opportunity to present. The text, recommended as a supplementary reference, will be DNA: The Story of the Genetics Revolution (2017) James D. Watson with Andrew Berry and Kevin Davies (A.A. Knopf, NY). Coordinator: Steve Munroe. Steve is Professor Emeritus of Biological Sciences at Marguette University where he taught biochemistry and conducted research in molecular genetics for more than 35 years. He has been interested in the human genome project since its

inception.

This course will offer provocative discussion of current events in the wake of Trump's departure from the White House.

Coordinator: Stephen Pastore. Stephen has coordinated courses similar to this numerous times and rarely fails to entertain and annoy participants to distraction, while simultaneously respecting all opinions and comments offered no matter the source.
